

Yale President Richard Levin Featured Speaker at Club Event

President Richard Levin '72 MPhil, '74 PhD returned to Southwest Florida to report on recent developments at the university and the plans for the future. Over 140 alumni and friends assembled at the Collier Athletic Club for cocktails and his presentation on February 28th.

It was clear from Levin's remarks that Yale's campus renovation continues at a pace unparalleled in the last sixty years. Practically every aspect of the physical plant is undergoing restoration. With work on the colleges, libraries, arts and athletic facilities having begun, Levin spoke of the ambitious plans for the science and engineering facilities. Over \$500 million is committed to this upgrading effort.

Yale's success in attracting the highest quality students, faculty and deans continues to be encouraging. Applications and yields on offers of admission increases each year. Faculty recruitment is achieving excellent results, and seven women are joining the senior ranks.

After the formal part of his presentation, Levin answered questions. In response to a question about the profile of the university from an international perspective, Levin clearly stated that Yale would remain an American university with international distinction, and would not become a global university that happens to be located in New Haven. This, as well as his entire presentation, received a warm applause.





TRUSTEE PROFILE



S. Kenneth Bruce, Jr. '53E

Ken Bruce has been a Trustee of The Yale Club since 1991, and he served as our President in 1994. He grew up in Manchester, NH and graduated from Governor Dummer Academy in Byfield, MA in 1949 and headed for Yale where he played some football, lacrosse and skied and was a member of Phi Gamma Delta fraternity. Ken received his Navy commission at OCS and served for three years with the SEA BEES.

Ken married Nancy Stebbins in 1953, and they were blessed with four children. Sadly, she passed away in 1988 after a long battle with cancer. He subsequently married Nancy Van Dussen and they moved to Naples to start a new retired life together.

After the Navy and for 22 years Ken was with Standard Knapp, a packaging machinery manufacturer in Middletown, CT where after years in sales he became its President. He was very active in the industry's national association, and was elected to be its Chairman in 1980. In the same year, he left Connecticut to head up a new electronics packaging company in Tampa, FL. After his first wife became stricken in 1984, they returned to his native New Hampshire to run his own large steel distribution business. Ken says it was fun and a different type of challenge, but when his wife died, he sold his holdings and moved to Naples with Nancy.

In addition to his Presidency of our Club and years as a Trustee, Ken has been Treasurer, chaired both Yale Glee Club concerts and co-chaired many other events. He has worked tirelessly with other trustees to reorganize the Club, update our by-laws, and grow our membership.
